1. For each of (a) and (b) either prove or give a counterexample. Suppose that for every  $n \in \mathbb{N}$ ,  $f_n : X \rightarrow [0, 1]$  is a  $\mu$ -measurable function, and

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \int f_n d\mu = 0.$$

Then

- (a)  $f_n \rightarrow 0$  in measure  
 (b) for  $\mu$ -almost all  $x \in X$ ,  $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} f_n(x) = 0$ .
2. Let  $f_n : \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$  be Borel measurable for every  $n \in \mathbb{N}$ . Define  $E$  to be the set of points in  $\mathbb{R}$  such that  $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} f_n(x)$  exists and is finite. Show that  $E$  is a Borel measurable set.
3. Does there exist a nowhere dense subset of  $[0, 1]^2 \subset \mathbb{R}^2$
- (a) of Lebesgue measure greater than  $9/10$ ?  
 (b) of Lebesgue measure 1 ?

If yes, construct such a set, if no, prove why not.

4. Let  $\lambda \in (0, 1)$ , and  $f \in L^1([0, 1])$ . Show that the integral

$$F(x) = \int_0^x \frac{1}{(x-t)^\lambda} f(t) dt$$

exists a.e.  $x \in [0, 1]$  and that  $F \in L^1([0, 1])$ .

5. Show that for  $g \in L^3([0, 1])$ ,  $f \in L^{3/2}([0, 1])$

$$\int_0^1 \cos 2\pi nx g(x) f(x) dx \rightarrow 0$$

as  $n \rightarrow \infty$ .

6. Assume that  $f, f' \in L^1(\mathbb{R})$ . Let

$$g(x) = \sum_{k=0}^{\infty} |f(x+k)|.$$

Show that  $g \in L^\infty(I)$  for any bounded interval  $I$ . (Hint: first prove for intervals with length  $\leq \frac{1}{2}$ ).
